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

Fiscal reporting and the importance of Budget Monitoring

Description: This session is geared toward grant recipients' fiscal staff; however, grant recipients' program staff are welcome to attend. Regional office staff will review the requirements and content of the SF-425, SF-428 and SF-429 reports and discuss the various platforms that are used to submit these reports. We will review the contents of a Notice of Award and where to look for important dates tied to fiscal reporting. We will discuss the importance of regular budget vs. actual expenditure monitoring (who should be involved, when conversations should occur around projected unspent funds and options for re-purposing those funds within appropriate timeframes). We will also review the differences between liquidation extensions and no cost extensions. Focus: Fiscal Reporting & Budgeting

Confronting Poverty

Unfortunately, as we see and hear all too often these days, the school setting, like many other places, is becoming more vulnerable to risks that could threaten the very safety we so often take for granted. Craig Cable, Safety and Security Consultant and Trainer

Craig is a risk management expert who provides safety and security consulting and training for schools, corporations, and nonprofits around the country.

In addition to Craig's safety and security experience, he is a sworn peace officer serving as a Reserve Deputy at the Larimer County Sheriff's Office located in Fort Collins, Colorado. As a member of law enforcement, he not only protects Larimer County's citizens as a volunteer patrol deputy but also county schools as a school marshal and certified School Resource Officer. He is an instructor for the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), which specializes in de-escalating individuals who are a potential danger to themselves, and/or others. Craig has an extensive training background which includes active shooter response training through the Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training program. He is a Threat Liaison Officer who works closely with the FBI to identify potential threats against schools and critical infrastructure in Larimer County. He is also an NRA-certified firearms instructor, Range Safety Officer, and tactical trauma trainer. Craig has trained hundreds of security team leaders, community volunteers, and individuals working in schools, places of worship as well as numerous public settings.

Dominique NC Lewis is a career long champion for children and youth. She has spent her career working with children and youth programs with goals of supporting holistic and healthy development. She and her family reside in the Kansas City Metro area and are active in sports recreation and traveling.

Dominique is a graduate from both the University of Kansas and Oklahoma State University. With Dominique's long-term experience working in varied serving children; she has observed the importance of inclusive learning, intentional teaching and honoring play within the classroom. Her pedagogical approach is founded on ideas of equity and access for all children; she insists that these investments on behalf of children are the key to community sustainability.

As she continues to support local programs and their efforts to meet obstacles with strategy, Dominique also serves as an educator at Children's Mercy Hospital. She credits her rigor and creativity to great leaders like her dad and her first grade art teacher. Dominique holds education with a high regard.
